

Join the chain of survival

ONE of the worst things that can happen to any of us is to experience a cardiac arrest. In such a situation every second counts. The chances of survival are greatly improved if the 'Chain of Survival' is followed.

There are four steps in this chain. The first step is the early recognition of the cardiac arrest and then the call for help by dialling 999 or 112. If you have someone with you, send them for a defibrillator. The second step is to start CPR. The 999 call handlers may guide you through this if you have not done it before. Training is easy and readily available from a number of providers. The third step is the early use of a defibrillator or AED (Automated External Defibrillator) This is used third step is the early use of a definitiator of AED (Automated External Definitiator). This is used to restart the heart and substantially increases the chances of survival by as much as five times. There are a number of these about the village. You may be told by the call handler where there is one. Do not stop CPR to find one. Get a bystander to use www.defibfinder.uk to see which is the nearest. These machines give clear instructions in how they should be used. The final step is early access to advanced medical care.

On 22nd May at 7.30pm the Parish Council has arranged a defibrillator training session in the village hall to give you the confidence you need to help save a life. It is free. Sign up by emailing enquiries@linton-pc.gov.uk

Seven days, so many ways to make a difference

ST. MARY'S Church has organised a grand coffee morning as part of Christian Aid Week 2024.Organiser Pam Richardson said, 'Every year, during this appeal, people across Britain and Ireland have seven days and so many ways to raise funds to support their global neighbours, in a celebration of hope for a fairer world. We are taking part at St. Mary's on Saturday May 18^{th} between 10-12 noon because we'd like to play our part in supporting our global neighbours. There'll be refreshments, stalls, games and a raffle for all the family to enjoy.

This year's appeal - from 12-18th May - is focusing on work in Burundi, one of the most densely populated and poorest countries in Africa. Heavily reliant on agriculture, it's also one of the least prepared to combat the effects of climate change. More than 70 per cent of the population live in poverty and more than half of children are chronically malnourished. Christian Aid has been working in Burundi since 1995. Now, alongside local partners, the organisation helps establish Village Savings and Loans Associations (VSLAs). These community-led groups mean people can save and borrow money, making small businesses possible, offering reliable and diverse incomes.

Aline Nibogora is the chairperson of a VSLA which supports some 25 families in a remote village in Makamba Province. Aline escaped an abusive marriage only to find herself on the streets begging for a place to stay. Her life changed when she went to a three-day, Christian Aid funded community workshop. With a small start-up loan, Aline began trading avocados and peanuts locally. She's now a grocery wholesaler and living on her own plot of land where she's building a home for her family.

Hundred Parishes National Hedgerow Week



Linton

AS day length increases and the air becomes warmer, plants put out new shoots. Many insects emerge and birds pair up, preparing to breed. Since the 1960's, the average minimum winter temperatures have been rising. Snowfall is now a rarity, and frosty days are much less frequent.

The current growing season is almost a month longer than 50 years ago. Primroses and bluebells are opening earlier. Researchers recorded that the first flowering of some 406 plant species has advanced by almost a month since 1986! This has affected the emergence of pollinating insects such as bees and butterflies; some are adapting to the warmer climate climate

Hedgerow shrubs and trees are leafing and flowering earlier too, providing food for many hungry caterpillars, which are themselves ideal food for nestlings. Hedgerows are a themselves ideal food for nestlings. Hedgerows are a valuable wildlife habitat, often providing a living framework to the landscape and our rural heritage. Long-established hedges grow in soil that is rich in stored carbon, and older trees within the hedgerow also hold large stores of carbon.

A recent planning application to fell an ancient hedgerow oak close to Clavering led to a vigorous and successful campaign by residents to save it.

This tree is now registered on the Ancient Tree Inventory, a record similar to the one for listed buildings. There are more trees in local hedgerows that could be recorded.

KEITH Day, our speaker, told members his grandmother's very interesting history and showed us pages from a notebook she kept containing recipes,

herbal remedies, knitting patterns, etc.
After her death in 1995, Keith found the notebook whilst going through family treasures, put some of it on Facebook, and got 888 requests for a copy of it! He racebook, and got assi requests for a copy of it. He decided to self-publish it and the first 100 copies sold out within three days. He brought along copies for our members to buy. Keith also handed round biscuits made from one of the recipes and asked members what the secret ingredient was. Nobody guessed, but it turned out to be ground rice. Delicious they were too, nice and

crunchy.

One herbal remedy contained syrup of squills and syrup of poppies, making laudanum. An indigestion remedy contained brandy, sentien root, bitter aloes, aniseed, compound of rhubarb and cayenne pepper. A gingerbread recipe contained sal volatile (smelling salts) which makes ammonia in the oven.

Copies of the notebook have gone to the Bodleian Library at the University of Oxford and the British Library. Keith also has a very interesting history himself, having been a botanist, a teacher, and worked for MI6. At our next meeting on 6th May, a lady called Rose is going to talk about bone health. 

Country Matters

Chalk Streams

ANYONE interested in rivers, canals, estuaries, water levels, and pollution will hear mention of chalk streams. What is a chalk stream, and why are they so important

Chalk streams arise from springs in landscape with chalk bedrock. Depending on which figures you read, there are 210 chalk streams worldwide, 160 of which are in England, and 58 in East Anglia, including our own River Granta. They only exist where chalk bedrock meets the surface of the ground, and this is an area from the south of Yorkshire down to Hampshire.

In what ways are they so different from our other rivers? They are clean and clear, with water coming up from underground instead of dodgy run-off from fields and roads. Being fed from aquifers, the flow, the mineral content and the temperature range are much more constant, and the water is gin clear. They

are high in nitrate, phosphate, potassium and silicate, an atmosphere in which fish thrive, and contain plenty of gravel in which salmon and trout spawn. If you walk through RSPB Fowlmere up the road, you will see watercress growing in the summer, with fish clearly visible. The water is so well oxygenated and rich in nutrients and micro organisms that it teams with wildlife other than and micro-organisms that it teems with wildlife other than fish, such as kingfishers, swans, water voles, and damselflies.

> Before we sit back and relax with this picture of a rural idyll, we have to remember that water companies love this water too, and have been over extracting for decades. Our increasing population and vast house building projects need water. Some rivers and streams are reduced to a miserable trickle in summers, and in wet winters are polluted with sewage and agricultural run-off. Step forward the Chalk Stream Restoration Society, founded in 2021. Chalk streams are now designated high priority sites of special natural heritage, needing restoration of chalk stream catchment areas. These schemes are launched by water companies and driven by local communities such as our own Friends of the River Granta. FROG gets support for rubbish clearance and conservation from

RiverCare, Beach Care, the Wild Trout Trust and Linton Parish The Granta is beautiful and rare, and we are lucky to have it running

Gardening Club Diary

THERE was a late change to the Linton Gardening Club April meeting. Instead of a talk on composting, we welcomed Peter Jackson who gave us an entertaining and enjoyable talk on the topic of 'Perennials'. As the name suggests, perennials give year-round structure, form and colour in the garden and form a framework for vibrant and bright tender summer bedding plants. Lasting for two or more years and often easy to divide or propagate, their use is

a satisfying and cost-effective way of gardening.

I have been potting up overwintered cuttings of pelargoniums and other house plants, dahlias and hostas. By early May, the risk of frost has passed but do keep a wary eye on the weather forecast. Whether grown from cuttings, seed or shop bought, grow on bedding plants, tomatoes and suchlike under cover. If the weather is reasonable, gradually accustomise bedding plants to outdoor conditions before planting out in their final flowering positions. Spring is one of the busiest times of the gardening year but I like to indulge in the pristine but transient beauty of the newly emerged foliage, blossom and flowers before time spoils things. The forms, colours and beauty make the effort in gardening well worthwhile.

The next meeting is on Tuesday 14th May at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. Garden Club members will be demonstrating and sharing tips on planting containers for summer interest and colour. As usual, there will be teas and a raffle and all are welcome to attend and participate. Entry is £3 for non-

Normally the club would resume in September but because there are no volunteers to take up the positions of Chair and Secretary, sadly this is likely to be the last ever meeting of the Linton Gardening Club unless someone comes forward.

District and County Councillors' Report – April 2024

Zero Carbon Communities Grant
The popular Zero Carbon Communities grant from South
Cambs District Council is now open again - https:// southcambsweb.azurewebsites.net/climate-emergency-andsoutheambawe.carewosnes.neventace-tine-gray-ana-nature/zero-carbon-communities-grant - community groups, as well as parish councils, can apply for funding for green and sustainable energy projects. The deadline for applications is June 2nd, so don't hang around. Rural Prosperity Fund

There is a new fund from central government, facilitated by the District Council, that is aimed at supporting rural communities to help support local businesses and communities. Worth taking a look at if you need funding for a project or you're a local business wanting to expand and progress - https://www.scambs gov.uk/business/uk-shared-prosperity-fund/rural-england-prosperity-fund/ - applications open on Monday April 8th and when the money is gone, it's gone!

Local Elections
You'll be pleased to hear there is only one local election this year, for the Police and Crime Commissioner of Cambridgeshire. This doesn't get a huge amount of media coverage but is nevertheless an important role, so please do take the time to research the candidates and, if you can, vote. At some point this year there will also be a general election, with much more media coverage!

Solar Farm Proposal
Kingsway Solar, the company proposing the new solar farm
between the A11 and West Wratting/Balsham, have now given an informal presentation to local residents. The plans were lacking in some of the detail that people would have wanted to see at this stage but, as the applicants said at the meeting, the plans may change before a formal planning application is submitted. Other than the information that was presented at the meeting in March, there is still nothing tangible to link you to, other than West Wratting Parish Council's write-up of the event - https://westwratting.org.uk/parish_council-planningapplications/solar-farm/

Civil Parking Enforcement

The County Council now have traffic wardens patrolling South Cambridgeshire. They have a list of problem areas in each of our villages, supplied by Henry with support from your Parish Councils, but if anyone feels there are specific areas where illegal parking really is an issue, do let him know directly. <u>Cambridge 2040/2050</u>

In the Spring Statement, we heard that the Government are pressing ahead with their plans to make Cambridge an economic development hub for the science and tech sector. The catch to attracting companies to move to our area is to build circa 150,000 houses around Cambridge to make this proposal more sustainable. The local authorities in the affected area, South Cambridgeshire, Cambridge City and the County Council are still fighting to stay at the table, if this does progress.



Grant Funding Awards Supporting the Community

THE Cambridgeshire Constabulary Priorities at this time are Domestic Abuse, Child Sexual Exploitation, Serious Sexual Offences, Fraud, Modern Slavery and Trafficking, High Harm Offenders, Street based Knife

Crime, Organised Crime and Burglary, County Lines,

Crime, Organised Crime and Burgiary, County Lines, Serious and Organised Crime.

The Cambridgeshire Policing structure is as follows; there is 1 Inspector, 2 Sergeants, 5 Constables, 3 PCSOs, 5 24/7 reactive policing teams, 1 Inspector, 5 Sergeants and 3 Officers across the whole of Cambridgeshire.

Also there are support teams such as CID and Specialist teams such as Traffics, Firearms, Dog Units, Rural and Community Action Teams. Operational support including the use of drones and neighbourhood support teams.

The crime undate for December, January, and February.

The crime update for December, January and February shows that in December 530 cases were reported (last year it was 544), January 511 cases were reported (last year it was 600) and February 564 cases were reported (last year it was 575). A complete breakdown can be found on their website (www.cambs.police.uk).

Some of the activities in the last three months are as follows:

There were 7 Section 59 warnings issued to people at car meets, there were 9 vehicles seized across Cambridgeshire for either no Insurance or no Driving Licence and 36 speed checks were conducted in a number of different villages.

Drug crime was as follows - There were 38 stop and searches of persons and vehicles believed to be involved with drug related offences. I person was arrested for Possession with the Intent to Supply.

The planned week of action against Knife Crime was very successful - test purchasing showed that the majority of shops were checking ID and acting both legally and morally. Knife Amnesty boxes worked well with a large quantity of knives handed in.

The Police currently have a list of young people they are keeping an eye on, checking on them regularly so that they know the Police are watching them. And finally, one young person was dealt with for having a knife on school premises. They are now working with the Youth Team to prevent further offences.

It is really important that we all report any incidents of crime in Linton and the surrounding area to the Police by using 111 or by signing up to Ecops. If incidents are not reported then the Police believe that Linton is a quiet crime free village and therefore the more incidents reported the more Police presence we will get in Linton.

Greater Cambridge Chalk Stream Project



THE STRETCH of the Granta flowing through the Pocket Park has been selected by the Greater Cambridge Chalk Stream Project to be part of their chalk stream restoration

The river currently has some excellent attributes, attracting endangered species including water vole. Evidence of voles was found during a meeting between the Linton Friends of the River Granta (FROG's), Linton Parish Council (LPC) and the team from the Greater Cambridge Shared Planning (GCSP). The Pocket Park can be included in the improvements, so

we have been encouraged to consider what would encourage further respectful use of the area. This could include sensitive changes to the paths to make more areas accessible even after bad weather, additional information boards to help with seasonal identification of wildlife, improving the ponds and ditches, and the the provision of additional seating areas or hides, etc.

If you are interested in being involved in this work and are not already a member of the FROG's, please let us know. We have been promised that most of the works will be carried out by the project team, but there will still be opportunities for volunteers to join in and help.
