We care if you need a repair

ABINGTON'S third Repair Café, which is open to Linton residents, will run from 10am to 1pm on Saturday 28th March at Abington Village Institute (66 High St, Great Abington CB21

Don't bin it if it can be fixed is the principle of Repair Cafés. These events aim to bring together experienced repairers with people who need faulty or damaged appliances, devices and other possessions repaired. They are your opportunity to take along something you own that is not functioning or usable, to see whether a knowledgeable expert can bring it back into use by a simple repair instead of it being binned. If you bring an item to be fixed, you will sit alongside the repairer attempting the repair, to maybe lend a hand and to be consulted if some critical point

What can I bring?

You can bring to be repaired: portable household appliances and electrical items (excluding microwave ovens and TVs), computers, mobile phones, jewellery, bicycles, garden tools, pumps, and fabric items and clothes needing sewing repair.

Do I need to book?

It's best to book your slot, which you can do by sending an email to repaircafe@theabingtons.org.uk, with as many relevant details of your repair as you can find (what is it? manufacturer, purchase date, model number, nature of fault, etc). The organisers will then get back to you with an appointment time. Or you can just drop in on the day, when you may have to join a queue, but why not have a coffee in Jeremiah's café in the Institute while you wait.

Is there a charge?

Repairs by volunteer repairers, whether successful or not, are free, but donations will be invited to cover the costs of the Repair Café.

The Abington Repair Café team look forward to seeing you on the day.

OUR speaker for the Garden Club February meeting was Tim Freathy. Both he and his partner originally lived in Cambridge but they wanted a larger garden, and found an old farmhouse with six acres at Depden in Suffolk

There, they set about creating the beautiful garden we can see today. Much of the planting was to shield the property from the busy road at the front. There is a pink theme through most of the garden with a purple bed, a gravel and alpine garden near the pond and many roses which flower over a long period.

An orchard was planted, a vegetable garden with raised beds was made and a poly tunnel built. The Depden Care Farm was looking for a new home which Tim and his partner were able to offer. This is run by the Millenium Farm Trust which offers people with mental health issues and learning difficulties a chance to learn skills in Horticulture, agriculture and animal husbandry A timber framed, thatched retreat was built for people work-

ing in the garden to go for quiet and shade. There are groups of 12 people a day working and looking after the animals. A lot of the produce is sold outside the farm which helps to raise money. Much kindness and care has gone into creating a beautiful place to be and to learn new skills which could change lives.

They are widespread in woods, bushes, farms, parks and gar-dens, and their numbers grow faster in urban areas due to lack of obvious threats. They are known for picking up shiny objects simply out of curiosity, and are persistent, noisy and conspicuous predators. They cackle relentlessly, and gather in tree tops. If there is any disturbance in the garden, the magpie is usually at the root of it. Poor Ben was traumatised by a magpie flying straight in front of him, baby blackbird in its strong bill, hotly pursued by 2 desperate parents.

In summer they eat spiders, worms, leatherjackets, beetles, flies, caterpillars and worms, and in winter wild fruits, berries, grains and household scraps. They can also store excess food in gutters and roof eaves.

Groups are called parliaments, and they sound the alarm against cats, patrolling lawns and flower beds in a proprietorial manner. Gamekeepers used to control their numbers, but since

the 1981 Wildlife and Countryside Act, they have been protected.

In folklore they are said to be in league with the Devil and many stories abound about them. My favourite is that the magpie refused to enter Noah's Ark, preferring to stay on the roof and swear loudly throughout the Flood.

A1307:UPGRADES to the road are moving forward. The east-bound bus lane and speed limit changes outside Linton are now implemented, along with the upgraded foot/cycle path next to the road. Work has begun on the traffic lights at the top of Linton High Street and will continue for up to six weeks.

THIS year is the 75th anniversary of the last year of World War 2. Some dates, such as VE Day on 8th May, will be celebrations; other dates have been, and will be, commemorated in a very different spirit.

Monday 27th January was Holocaust Memorial Day and marks the date of the liberation of Auschwitz by the Soviet Army. Throughout the week the College held assemblies, and Year 7 Religious Studies lessons focussed on the Shoah or calamity of the Nazi's attempted genocide. The Holocaust is a grim reminder of what humans are capable of doing to each other and that is exactly the reason why we are required to teach it. Understanding the Holocaust is essential in helping students realise why we must treat others as equals and protect the vulnerable. Students never forget learning about the Holocaust and I hope that continues to be the case. If we succeed in that, perhaps the Jewish prayer of Never Again will be fulfilled.

February was also LGBT (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender) History Month. In the 25 years I have been teaching, the shift in attitudes around LGBT issues has been nothing less than monumental. Legislation and new media attitudes have been significant in influencing change. Students who identify themselves as LGBT do so in an environment that is unrecognisable to the one that existed a quarter of a century ago. In fact, the shift has been so great, that part of the point of LGBT History Month is to remind and educate students that some of our great historical figures, such as Alan Turing, had to contend with levels of prejudice that meant their contributions and identities were hidden.

LVC places huge value on enriching the students' curriculum and we are fortunate to have staff that supports that ethos. During the February half term over 120 students went on the LVC Head of PE, and 15 other staff who gave up their break. To see the students' faces when they return is wonderful and the trip is always amongst the students' top memories.

By the time you are reading this, 40 of our Year 10 students

will be on their GCSE Chateau trip in France for a week. There is, quite simply, no substitute for being immersed in another culture to accelerate students' language acquisition. Having said that, as with the ski trip, it doesn't just happen. Once again the support staff at LVC have been putting in the hours with Mrs Fenn in the Finance Team bearing the brunt of the work. Schools at their best are genuinely extraordinary places, where dedicated staff make special things happen for our young people - we are fortunate to have such staff working at LVC.

Bartlow scandals - The libellous rector

THE Reverend Joseph Hall was the incumbent and Patron of the Living of St Mary's from 1782 until his death in 1828. A lovely man by all accounts. When his brotherin-law died, he took his sister and her children to live with him at Bartlow Rectory. He supported charities from the relief of the poor in Ireland to roof repairs at Addenbrooke's hospital. He was a magistrate and most unlikely criminal a saintly Rector presiding over his happy flock.

But trouble was brew-

ing. In 1802, a Cambridge Professor moved into Bartlow House and became Rev Hall's neighbour. When the Rector welcomed the new arrival, he found he was also a Christ's College man. He and the Professor, Doctor Busick Harwood, became friends and Dr Harwood, who was both scientist and art collector, even gave the Rector one of his pictures

Originally apprenticed to an apothecary, Harwood had subsequently qualified as a surgeon and made his fortune in the Indian Medical Service treating local princes. He returned to England for health reasons and could then af-ford to go to University. After graduating in the 1780s he became a Fellow of the Royal Society based on his thesis on blood transfusions. He stayed on at Cambridge, eventually

becoming both Professor of Anatomy and Downing Professor of Medicine.

He was renowned at the University for his public experiments. The most famous took place in the lecture theatre in the Old Botanic Gardens involving a blood transfusion between a sheep and a dog. He bled out the dog and then infused into it the blood of a conveniently adjacent sheep - the climax being when the recipient dog, having completely recovered, leapt off the table and trotted home.

Described as a popular bon viveur – witty but very licentious in conversation, eccentric and quarrelsome, it is difficult to imagine a less likely companion for Rev Hall and the friendship didn't

In 1806 Harwood, now Sir Busick Harwood, decided to move the Churchway footpath further away from his house and much nearer to Rectory garden. Rev Hall objected but Sir Busick moved it anyway. The new fence was visible from Rev Hall's study window. Relations deteriorated further when Sir Busick hung a human skeleton on it (something he had no trouble acquiring in his line of work). Poor old Rev Hall was beside himself. He returned the

picture he had been given and wrote a very stiff letter.

In it he told Sir Busick he was an embarrassment to the village, an ingrate, mean and unchristian in his behaviour. Sir Busick responded by issuing a Writ in the Court of Kings Bench for criminal li-bel. Rev Hall pleaded guilty at the first hearing and offered profuse apologies which Sir Buswick rejected. The Reverend listed the mitigating circumstances - his mortifi-cation at Sir Busick's hands and, particularly, the skeleton. Affidavits were filed by a vast number of gentlemen both clergy and laity of the first distinction as to his excellent character as a Christian, a divine, a magistrate and a man. A fine was imposed and Rev Hall had a criminal record.

Sir Busick left the village almost immediately and became Vice Master of Downing College where he lived and eventually died seven ears later in 1814.

Rev Hall outlived him by 14 years and on his death left a detailed will which confirmed his kindly character. He provided for all his servants, his widowed sister, his niece and nephew before setting up a trust of 19 guineas (currently worth just over £2,000) for the relief of the poor of Bartlow.

tell.
David was always reluctant to have pictures of him at work but, even so, Jennifer was able to photograph him at work in his beloved workshop, which was originally given to him by local farmer Ivan Clarke many years ago and remains there today, a year after David passed away at the age of 90.

David Lane was born in Ilford, Essex in 1928. Pottery was to become his keen interest and, after taking a teacher

training course, and travelling extensively, it was to become his life time career

In 1964 he was invited by the Rural Industrial Bureau to view some 500-year-old, Grade 2 listed cottages owned by the Cambridge Cottage Improve-ment Society in the village of Abington. Obviously seeing the potential, David moved in with his wife and young family.

Much hard work went into altering the buildings and facil-ities plus the workshop needed for the Abington Pottery to become successful. In addition, Abington Pottery became a familiar stall two days a week on Cambridge Market Square for 40 years.

Jennifer had brought along

a small selection of her own pots, jugs and plates made by David and concluded the evening by showing pictures featuring the designs and patterns, so distinctive of the Abington

Pottery Like most excellent works of art, the Fitzwilliam Museum holds a piece of his work and rightly so.

TIER ONE Tree Survey, Annual Review- A meeting with Argenta Tree Services Ltd to review the work identified in the triennial safety survey of trees under the responsibility of LPC Present: Cllrs Kate Kell (Tree Warden) and Enid Bald (Reserve Tree Warden) and Mr. Ian Lorman from Argenta Tree Services

Urgent and second line work has been done, with some new work identified. Advice was given regarding thinning of tree groups and pollarding/coppicing as a better way to manage trees, rather than shortening of branches (which can lead to loss of form and shape). Removal of some shrubs suggested for aesthetic and preventative reasons.

Local Highways Initiative - A review panel meeting held by Cambridgeshire County Council Highways Department to review applications from Parish Councils for funding requests

through the Local Highways Initiative Scheme.

Attended by: Cllr Enid Bald on behalf of Linton Parish Council. LPC had submitted an application to improve and add new signage, road markings and other safety measures. Once parking restrictions are clearly marked, then enforcement can be initiated.

The submission was well received by the committee, includ-ing support for the Rural Transport Hub to alleviate parking problems in the village centre.

In recent years Linton Parish Council have been successful with submissions for traffic calming measures at The Grip, safety and speed signs on "gates" at village entrances, dropped kerbs and many other improvements.

A1307 Villages Forum -

Present: Representatives of nine villages which are impacted by the A1307. Cllrs John and Enid Bald attended as representatives for Linton Parish Council.

Meeting with the Mayor, James Palmer (JP), who noted that only London and this area were net contributors to the economy. but investment to infrastructure had always been low; development needs concurrent infrastructure.

Future housing should be controlled, envisaged as new garden towns, protecting villages and rural character. Where would these six new settlements be? One could be in A1307 area. Transport plans are for high quality, low carbon public transport, probably Cam Trams routes with adjacent cycle lanes,

some using redundant rail routes.

Dualling of A1307 is not cost effective and now not likely The GCP/City Deal proposals are not under his control (bus

lanes at Linton, for example) and he asked to be kept informed. Other matters - Planning Department. We agreed that this was performing poorly and insufficient attention was given to parish comments. Local Plan consultations are unwelcoming to our views

BARTLOW Road - It might have been the lead up to Christmas, but Linton Parish Council's Planning Committee were working all through to try to have the perverse SCDC planning decision overturned.

Although Council took legal advice and had a case, the fi-nancial risks of going to Judicial Review were too great. It is sad that finance might limit justice.

LPC does not feel that the decision process was correct and have sought to have the decision called in for scrutiny. The application was almost identical to the previously refused application, and the appeal decision on that has not been made - that verdict will be interesting. Meanwhile, we are watching the Granta rise over the flood-

plain towards the base of the spoil heaps - and that after really rather modest rainfall...

Paynes Meadow- The outline application for 26 social houses was refused. Although social and shared equity housing would have been welcomed, the effect on the valued landscape and poor design meant that these were not suitable for the location.

Residents, represented by Mark Ganderton, LPC represented by Enid Bald and supported by Cllrs Batchelor, spoke against the application at the SCDC planning meeting.

stood the many issues that led to the refusal.

five vacancies available for co-option.

Chairman's Comment: Happy New Year to Councillors and parishioners! Cllr John Bald was thanked for assisting in the contact with the Police Commissioner regarding the issues with planning down Bakers Lane.

The Chairman continued that members of the Parish have every right to contact the Parish Council should the issues not be being addressed from other elements of Local Government.

The Chairman thanked Cllr Enid Bald, Chairman of the Planning Committee, for all her hard work on the Bartlow Road planning application. District Councillor John Batchelor was also thanked for his continued support regarding the Bart-low Road planning application as well as for the excellent job of chairing the South Cambridgeshire District Council Planning Committee meeting where the Paynes Meadow planning application was considered. The meeting was conducted very professionally and summed up very well. Finally, Cllr Brian Cox (Dr) was thanked for his assistance

with the panels in the churchyard.

Open Forum for Public Participation None To Approve minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on the 12th December 2019. Cllr John Bald proposed the minutes,

Cllr Lee Gardner seconded. **Agreed with one abstention. Matters Arising/Clerk's Report**: Update on phone line contracts, call plan and new broadband provider. The provider has now been changed to Onecom and an additional line is being fitted. Noted.

Notice of the new meeting table in Village Hall meeting room to allow for more meetings to be held at the PC office. A new table has been purchased for the meeting room on the first floor of the Village Hall, this should allow for meetings to be held more frequently at the Village Hall. **Noted.**Update on the new office PC's and thanks to Cllr Lee Gard-

ner for his assistance. Cllr Lee Gardner has kindly built a specification for the two new desktop computers for the office. This has actually come in under budget so the Clerk shall continue to process the order. Noted.

Consideration and formal adoption of the Councillor and

Staff expenses policy. Councillors reviewed this document and made the decision that they felt you should not have one policy that applies to both staff and Councillors so this should be split into two separate policies. Clerk to bring back to the next meeting for re-review.

Planning Matters

Consideration of the Planning Committee minutes from the meeting of the 12th December 2019. Noted. Horseheath Road

Update on the Planning application for Horseheath Road, application reference S/4418/19/RM, for the erection of 42 dwellings including the provisions of 0.45ha for allotments on the land south of Wheatsheaf Barn, Horseheath Road, following the Planning Committee meeting of Linton Parish Council. Verbal update from the Chairman of the Planning Committee, Councillor Enid Bald.

The developers have met with Linton Parish Council twice now, and it is felt that a lot of issues have been dealt with, however, when the application was formally received there were still some issues that have not been dealt with that required addressing.

There were no archaeology or heritage assessment or re-port included and the traffic issues were not addressed. The concerns pertaining to the gradient of the slope of the road and there are concerns that Cambridgshire County Council Highways may not adopt the road due to this. The ransom strip of land is causing issues with some of the residents from Lonsdale

Agreement of the Parish Council to support the recommendation of the Planning Committee regarding the decision on the Horseheath Road application; The Planning Committee has reviewed the application and despite the fact that many of the issues had been addressed, there were still several aspects which are cause for concern.

It was felt that if the Parish Council did not object, then these issues may not be reviewed or addressed. As a result, the Planning Committee had objected to the application and asked for this to go to the SCDC Planning Committee to be considered. Council were then asked to vote on whether they agreed

with this decision and wish to progress the objection. Cllr Enid Bald proposed that Linton Parish Council continue with the onjection and request this is taken to SCDC full Planning Committee, Cllr Amy Smith seconded, put to a vote with seven in favour and two abstentions. Agreed to support the decision of the Planning Committee.

Bartlow Road Planning Applications

Update on the planning appeal, reference APP/ W0530/W/19/3235259 for Bartlow Road planning application S/2487/18/RM. Verbal update from the Chairman of the Planning Committee, Councillor Enid Bald.

There is currently no further update on the appeal available, however the Clerk is monitoring the progress on the Planning Inspectorate website and has been in touch with the Case Officer.

Update on planning application S/2501/19/RM, following the decision not to hold the extra-ordinary council meeting originally scheduled for the 20th December 2019. Verbal update from the Vice-chairman, Councillor John Bald and the Chairman of the Planning Committee, Councillor Enid Bald.
